

Why should You and I share decision making?

The research tells us that if decision making is shared, people are more likely to:

-  Understand what is involved in any decision;
-  Have thought through what is important;
-  Feel supported and empowered to make choices about care;
-  Follow the agreed treatment or care plan;
-  Have confidence and manage care better;
-  Improve health behaviours;
-  Make best use of available services.

When will You and I share decision making?

Shared decision making is common practice in most circumstances. This is how we should be working.

In exceptional circumstances, Health and Social Care staff are required to make a decision, for example, in a clinical or safety emergency.

In these circumstances, people are protected by clear laws and guidance. Communication should include open and honest explanation. Staff are also guided by Professional Codes of Practice.
